

### 7. ACES 101: Adverse Childhood Experiences

Both positive and negative childhood experiences have a tremendous impact on a person's future. The Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) Study shows us the true affects trauma experienced as a child can have on a person's lifespan and how those experiences can be linked to the development and prevalence of a wide range of problems, including those associated with violence victimization and perpetration, health and opportunity. In this workshop you will learn general information about the ACEs Study, explore neurobiology that explains why ACEs impact people's lives, and learn how ACES informs prevention work.
